# Growing Gesneriads Outdoors on Long Island

Titanotrichum oldhamii is an Asian gesneriad, found in southeast China and Taiwan. The interesting fact about this gesneriad is that it is rhizomatous — the only one found outside of the Americas. It seems to be hardy in the ground through most of USDA Zone 7, which includes the middle of Long Island, in New York State, where I live. However, I do not grow it directly in the ground but in a large tub. The tub (with the rhizomes) spends the winter in an unheated garage. During that time I do not water it. New growth has been evident every spring for the last three years when I place the tub in an area of the garden that receives some sun but is mostly bright shade. I have found that too much sun will burn the leaves. The plant blooms in August and September, and it can put on quite a show of yellow/orange blossoms. In late fall the tub is moved back into the garage. Some growers caution that the rhizomes should not dry out in the winter,

while others caution that the rhizomes, if left in the ground, should not be given too much water. However, during the growing season *T. oldhamii* must be kept moist. It can be easily lost if it were to go dry. I think that this plant is worth a try and you should experiment to determine what method of growing works best for you. I have found that T. oldhamii produces a nice crop of rhizomes that can be harvested at any time, but I am now of the opinion that early spring is the best time to do this, since divisions and rhizomes harvested in the fall did not fare very well. My plant has not been fertilized the entire time that I have had it.

Hemiboea subcapitata is a Chinese gesneriad that is a hardy perennial through USDA Zone 7 and can grow into a small shrub in the garden. The plant prefers light to moderate shade and will spread, but it is not invasive. I obtained my plant from a member of the Greater New York Chapter who lives in the Bronx, New York City, and have been growing it for two seasons. This past summer was its third season in my garden. Each year the plant gets bushier. It finally bloomed in 2017 for the first time. The flowers are white, tubular with a yellow throat. So far, it has not bloomed prolifically for me but I think that this is the nature of the plant. I don't do anything special for it either when it is growing or during the

winter, although I daresay that occasional fertilizing wouldn't be a bad idea.
