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
Presidents Message

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	DAVS Schedule Until Show March 28th 2015	
Week of	Horticultural Duties to be Done	Count Down
Sept 29 th	Time to give your plants a healthy start. Repot and shape up, removing leaves as necessary. As always check for pests. Keep plants cool by gradually cutting back light to 8 hours or whatever is normal in your growing environment.	6 months befo
January 5 th	Once each year put in new warm and cool tubes in fixture. Keep light hours steady. Repot to size to shape up standard AVs and remove leaves if necessary. Don't go larger than one pot size.	12 weeks befo
January 19 th	Increase light time by half hour or so (85% of max). Completely disbud all plants except possibly minis and trailers. Start watering with your favorite bloom booster (high middle number like 12–55-6) follow half of package directions to avoid burning.	10 weeks befo
January 26 th	Increase light time by half hour or so (90% of max). Disbud heavily variegated varieties and double blossomed varieties for the last time (eg Rapsodies & Optimaras). Continue to disbud all other varieties. Continue use of bloom booster fertilizer.	9 Weeks befo
February 2nd	Increase light time by half hour or so (95% of max). Disbud doubles and lightly variegated varieties for the last time. Continue to disbud semi-double and single blossoms. Check for suckers and remove while small. Continue use of bloom booster.	8 weeks befor
February 9 th	Increase light time by half hour or so (should be up to 100% of planned max). Disbud semi-double star blossoms for the last time. Continue disbud singles and semi-double non-star. Revert to normal fertilizer (12-36-14 or 15-30-15).	7 weeks befor
February 16 th	Disbud Single blossoms for the last time. Check for suckers and remove. Check for powdery mildew. Wash foliage and check the	6 weeks before
March 9 th	Flower buds are beginning to emerge. Carefully straighten & space stems between leaves. Raise humidity to prolong blossom life. Cease foliar feeding. Carefully check for thrips, spray if necessary, (avoiding flowers) or use pest strips.	3 weeks befor
March 23 rd	Remove spent blossoms, flower stem and leaf stubs; Check for suckers and brush away soil and dust. Wash leaves if necessary. Pot up or down only if necessary. Use slip potting technique as to least disturb roots.	1 week befor
March 26 th	Last minute grooming. Remove spent blossoms and stubs. Prepare boxes for transport.	2 days befor
